





PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



have pleasure in presenting the 7th SIES Institutional Social Responsibility report for the year ended 31st March 2022. Seven years is as good a time frame as any now to assess the contribution of the Society to go beyond formal education and turn

out graduates from the institutions who are socially responsive and are committed to the welfare of not just themselves but to the neighbourhood as well. We started on a modest scale by energising our NCC and NSS activities and encouraging active participation of students in these voluntary services. Over the years, the students have taken up several social causes in the city and made an impactful change in the beneficiaries. What is significant about the year that has gone by is that even during pandemic times when all other activities had slowed down and classroom education had shifted to online mode, the Institutional Social Responsibilities were maintained at the same levels as during normal times reaffirming our commitment to ISR as an integral part of the educational delivery system that we provide.

COVID-19 had presented an unprecedented challenge to public health, food system and the world of work. The economic distress that nations are facing forcing them to the brink of bankruptcy had a telling effect on all human initiatives. Small wonder poverty grew manifold during this period and several lives were lost due to hunger and malnutrition. There could be no better time than these difficult periods to outpour our compassion, care and concern for the poor. Institutional Social Responsibility gained momentum during this period in our Society.

Institutional Social Responsibility helps build students and staff loyalty based on distinctive ethical values. It is a primary positioning tool for our society and is also a key contributing factor for our growth and visibility. That is why it has a pride of place in our Mission 2025. In our educational institutions, we are committed to building socially sensitive managers and leaders. This figures in various ways. As a first step, we will be introducing compulsory courses on ethics and ISR in all our autonomous and post graduate institutions. There is more to education than just being a means of earning livelihood. We will structure a Future Leadership Programme (FLP) partnering with NGOs and take part in initiatives that

combine leadership and social service. Imparting social entrepreneurship skills amongst youth can play a significant role in the holistic development of young people while also allowing them to contribute to the development of their own communities. These skills are beneficial to becoming active members of an organisation or society and are fundamental to making future leaders that will create value and also learn the importance of gratitude, teamwork, decision making, communication and critical thinking; skills every leader needs, in order to make a positive difference.

We will initiate this year a Social Audit Programme (SAP) for the transformation that we have brought about in Kawathewadi, Khairpada Digital School, Ghoteghar Ashramshala and Kalgaon Zilla Parishad School. We shall also conduct a detailed audit on the SIES-SEAT and the disbursements that have been made over the years as we widened the access for education and halted denial of education on grounds of affordability. As we take up new projects, we shall be guided by the outcome of the social audit in respect of the existing projects and fine tune our strategy as we expand the sweep of our influence in distant rural areas and help provide quality education.

The significant highlights of our ISR activities during the year were :

- 1. In SIES-SEAT, 437 students were given financial assistance of Rs. 50,03,862/-. 2788 students have benefitted from SIES-SEAT till now and an amount of Rs. 3,16,66,927/- has been disbursed till now.
- 2. The Bio-monitoring and indexing of 56 rivers of Maharashtra was successfully completed at 156 national water quality monitoring programme stations. The Maharashtra Pollution Control Board that sponsored the project has found considerable utility from this project undertaken by us.
- 3. The evaluation of the impact of several technologies in the improvement of onion yield and fertility has been a great boon for the farmers of onion growing areas of Sinnar, Niphad talukas of Nashik Maharashtra.
- 4. The SIES Indian Institute of Environmental Management supported BPCL Ltd. in the propagation of around 5 lakhs seed balls in Maharashtra for developing green cover. Detailed report enclosed.
- 5. The SIES SOP Star Awards 2022 continued to be a widely acknowledged awards scheme for encouraging research and innovation in packaging. This year several companies participated in the awards and 34 were the winners. Shri. Piyush Goyal, Hon'ble Union Minister for Commerce & Industry was appreciative of the efforts of the Society in packaging innovation, as he delivered the presidential address at the awards function.
- 6. The Kalgaon Zilla Parishad School renovation project was completed at year end and what is gratifying is that the school bagged the Swacch Vidyalaya Puraskar 2021-22

at the district level with a 5 star overall rating immediately thereafter. The renovated school was inaugurated on 27th April 2022.

- 7. The transformation of the students and the teachers in Ghoteghar Ashramshala has been inspiring and the Adivasi Seva Mandal has started a CBSE School from this academic year in this tribal area. What better certification for the positive change.
- 8. The Society carried out a free vaccination programme for all the faculty and staff of the institutions against the Corona infection and provided the required protection to enable them to discharge their responsibilities satisfactory.
- 9. In expanding our Army Connect ISR initiative, the Society would be supporting the Army Goodwill School at Karu, Leh district and Colaba Army Pre-primary School and Army Primary School with infrastructure upgradation.
- 10. The Apron project to support the self help female groups in Kawathewadi has been revived post pandemic to provide quality aprons to the science students of the various colleges.

Our institutional journey till now carries alongwith it the experience of nine decades of yeoman service in the cause of education. In just about a decade from now, the Society would be celebrating its centenary. There can be no better way to usher in the centenary of bliss than to have 100 social projects completed under SIES – ISR. We have taken the first steps in sensitising our students to the needs of social responsibility. Being active agents of change is not only a strategic priority in SIES but is also a much needed responsibility. The process of change requires co-operative efforts at all levels in the institution. Together we shall make the difference.



A JOURNEY INTO LIFE EDUCATION CONTINUES.....



EAT was inaugurated on the occasion of the Platinum Jubilee of the Society on 15th August 2008 by Bharat Ratna Dr. APJ Abdul Kalam to provide financial assistance for education of under privileged sections of the society. The cost of higher education has skyrocketed in recent times, virtually shutting doors to lower middle class and the poor. Students enrolled in the Society's institutions, unable to pay the fees, are encouraged to pursue their studies with financial support from SEAT covering the whole or part of their fees as per the appraisal of their financial position. SEAT singularly has been one of the major initiatives to widen the access for education. In addition to SEAT, the Society receives annual grants from Essar Endowment, Nihchal Israni Foundation Scholarship and Seth Bhojraj Hassomal Charitable Trust scholarship.

One of the limitation of SIES-SEAT and other scholarships is that the grants are restricted only to SIES students. With a view to expand the sweep of its influence and cover more students all across the city outside the SIES family, the Society donated a sum of Rs. 10.0 crores to Ghatkopar South Indian Educational Trust (GSIET). It also gave annual grants to GSIET for three years, the total donation being



2788 students were given fee assistance of Rs. 3,16,66,927. In addition, students not covered by SIES-SEAT have been beneficiaries under Essar Endowment, Nihchal Israni Foundation and Seth Bhojraj Hassomal Charitable Trust Scholarship. Many other students also benefitted from the interest earned on endowments set up to provide merit and need based scholarship.

Over the last seven years, the Society spend Rs. 14.67 crores in reaching out to the poor, deserving and meritorious to ensure no disruption to their academic pursuits. Singularly this is the most significant ISR initiative in education itself, of which we all can be legitimately proud of.

KAWATHEWADI

awathewadi is about 85 kms from Mumbai. Spread over 2.5 acres of land, it has a population of about 550 and 89 households. The villagers are Adivasis, hailing from the Pardhi community, a traditional nomadic tribe. The public perception is that they are criminals and hence stigmatized. This aggravates their backwardness and economic hardships.



The total amount spent in this project till 31.3.2022 was Rs. 1,71,30,305/-

Activities conducted in Kawathewadi since adoption

- 1. Soak Pits The villagers were involved in Shramadan for construction of soak pits in four different places and also for construction and repairing work for rain water harvesting systems.
- 2. Clean up drives Volunteer teams were created amongst villagers for clean up drives in and around villages.
- 3. Health campaign Health campaign focusing on dental care, dietary habits, nutritional

- and balanced food, hygiene, clean water were held regularly to help improve the overall health of the villagers. Cancer awareness and screening camps were organised with the support of TATA Memorial Hospital.
- 4. Teaching The NSS team of SIES College of Arts, Science and Commerce taught basics in English, Maths and Science to the students of the village school.
- 5. Beautification The walls of the school were painted with wall posters and pictures by the village volunteers alongwith NSS students.
- 6. Lifelong Learning Extension (LLE) The students of LLE and NSS team conducted games and learning sessions for the children of the village. Financial literacy, workshop on self defence, paper craft workshop, candle making, workshop on memory enhancement, gender equality and justice, team building were conducted for the villagers.
- 7. Story books, notebooks, school dress and bags were distributed to the students of the village.
- 8. Open defecation free village rally and tree plantation programmes enthused the villagers to care for the environment. Sanitary napkins were distributed to the households in the village.
- 9. Villagers were taught how to make soap.
- 10. A session on star with gazing telescopes mounted outside the Community Hall received enthusiastic support. For the first time villagers got an opportunity to view the famous star clusters and nebulas.
- 11. Villagers helped were to repair

the cattle shed, grass cutting, weeding in and around the village and compost pit renewal.

- 12. The use of internet, digitisation and computer literacy took the wonder out of the machine and villagers learnt how to use it.
- 13. All villagers were assisted in getting Aadhaar cards.
- 14. The Psychology Department conducted workshops on Anger management, deaddiction and clean habits.
- 15. A borewell was constructed for augmenting water supply in addition to rain water harvesting.
- 16. Larsen & Toubro's erection of street lights in the village infused new life into a dingy, decrepit village. Temple, village school, mangal karyalay and toilets were lit by LED lights.

ZILLA PARISHAD SCHOOL, **KHAIRPADA**

hairpada village was established in 1994 in the remote Shapur taluka in Thane district on the banks of river Bhatsa. It is an extreme poverty, deprived area inhabited by several tribes. A dilapidated school upto 4th Std. run by the Zilla Parishad was serving the educational needs of the village.

Our Society identified this village for school development and converted into a modern, digital school. The school was renovated at a cost of Rs. 38,30,593/-. The inhabitants in the village are Mahadeo Thakur, Varali and Aghari tribe. Thakari (Adivasi language) is the spoken language. Children of these tribes were not encouraged by the tribes to go to school. The much needed upgradation of the school motivated the tribals to send their children to the school thus giving a filip to school activities. In a very short time, there was a remarkable transformation.

- The school secured the green school award in 2017.
- Excellent Thane School honour certificate in 2018.
- 570 teachers and 62 educational teams from all over Maharashtra visited the Digital School.
- Further educational progress of the students is testimony to the quality of education imparted.

GHOTEGHAR ASHRAMSHALA OF ADIVASI SEVA MANDAL

he ISR activities of the Society reached its high point with the adoption of Adivasi Seva Mandal's Ghoteghar Ashram Shala.

Adivasi Seva Mandal is registered under the Societies' Registration Act, 1860 with the main objective to achieve the economic, social, educational and general uplift of the Varlis, Thakurs, Konkanas, Dharkarlis, Dublas, Mahadeo-kolis, Malhar - Kolis, Kotkaries and generally of all people aboriginal and hill tribes in Thane and Kulaba districts. In pursuance of this objective, it has established Ashram schools at various locations for Adivasi children. Ghoteghar Ashramshala in Shapur taluk, Thane district has over 450 girls staying and studying and has about 1000 Adivasi children studying in the Shala. Spread on a sprawling estate of 107960 sqmtrs (26.7 acres), with the western edge flanked by Bhatsa river, the Ashramshala is nestled between green agricultural fields and Bhatsa. The school infrastructure was nothing worth mention.











The Society entered into an MOU with Adivasi Seva Mandal on 30th December 2017 to adopt the Ashramshala which was in a state of dilapidation.

The entire renovation was done at a cost of Rs. 4,50,69,676/-. The Society added two new hostels one each for Boys and Girls, a new expansive dining hall to accommodate about 300 students at a time and computer learning centre. Since the facility was created in the 150th year of the Father of the Nation, a life size statue of Mahatma Gandhi in a separate enclosure was dedicated. At a glittering function on 13th October 2018, the Governor of Maharashtra, Shri. C. Vidyasagar Rao in the presence of Shri. Kapil Patil, the MP of the area inaugurated the facilities. The following activities were the highlights at the Ashram Kanya Shala during the year.

1. The School recorded 100% results at the March 2022 SSC examination, completely demonstrating that our transformational efforts have paid full dividends so soon.







2. A medical check-up of all the students was organised by the Society on 3rd January 2022 and remedial measures initiated for the students afflicted by various ailments.

KALGAON ZILLA PARISHAD SCHOOL



algaon village is in Dahivali, Shapur Taluka, District Thane. It is 22 kms from Shapur Town. The population of the village is 1051. The village has a Zilla Parishad School with classes from 1st to 7th Std. The School has 113 students (46 boys and 67 girls) and is managed by 5 teachers. The Secondary School is 3 kms away from Kalgaon.

The School was in a highly dilapidated condition. While the villagers were keenly interested in sending their children to the School, the absence of any worthwhile facility deterred the children. Our Society identified this school for upgradation like Khairpada. Renovation was carried out at a cost of about Rs. 24 lakhs. 20 slim computers were also donated to this school.

In the very first year after renovation, the school bagged the 'Swachh Vidyalaya Puraskar' 2021-22 at the district level with a five star overall rating. It also secured the award in the sub-category of behaviour change and capacity building and toilets. A proud achievement for a school which has now become the delight of the students. The school was dedicated by Shri. M. V. Ramnarayan, Hon. Secretary of the society at a function held on 27th April 2022.

THE ARMY CONNECT



1. Proposal

To encourage and assist children of armed forces serving or retired and children of widows of armed personnel to pursue higher education in engineering and management in SIES Institutions.

2. Collaborating Partner

General Officer Commanding (Maharashtra, Gujarat and Goa)

3. Courses covered

- a. SIES Graduate School of Technology (4 year degree programme after Plus 2)
- Bachelor of Computer Engineering
- Bachelor of Information Technology
- Bachelor of Electronics and Information Technology
- Bachelor of Electronics and Telecommunication
- Bachelor of Mechanical Engineering
- b. Courses under approval process
- Computer Science Engineering (Al and Machine Learning)
- Computer Science Engineering (Data Science)
- Computer Science Engineering (IOT and Cyber including Block chains)
- c. SIES College of Management Studies (2 years after graduation)
- Master of Management Studies (MMS)
- Master of Computer Application (MCA)

All these courses are approved by the All India Council for Technical Education (AICTE) and affiliated to the University of Mumbai

- d. SIES Institute of Business Studies
- Post Graduate Diploma in Business Management
- Post Graduate Diploma in Pharmaceutical Management (PGDPM)

These courses are approved by AICTE and are of two years duration after graduation.

e. SIES AIMA Programmes (All India Management Association)
These are weekend programmes conducted by AIMA, approved by AICTE and are of two years duration.

6. Admission Quota

A maximum of one child of the armed personnel, serving retired or martyred from the command area of Maharashtra, Gujarat and Goa would be admitted, subject to qualifying conditions, to anyone of the above programmes under the "Management Quota" of the institutions. If management quota is withdrawn by AICTE or any other Authority, then this scheme will come to an end.

7. Eligibility of children of war widows and the army personnel

- The widow should be a resident of Maharashtra or Gujarat or Goa.
- The student to be admitted should be the direct blood relation born to the widow and the army personnel.
- Only one child per family will be admitted to any of the courses under this scheme.
- No hostel facilities are available. The student will have to make his / her own accommodation arrangements in Mumbai / Navi Mumbai while pursuing these courses.

8. Fees Payable

- The students selected under this scheme shall pay 10% of the prescribed fees
 for the course of study. Examination fees and student registration charges payable
 to the University or Department of Technical Education of the Government of
 Maharashtra shall be paid by the students over and above the 10% of the prescribed
 fees
- Fees once paid shall be refunded only as per the rules framed by AICTE.
- The concessional fees shall be withdrawn if the student fails in the semester examinations and will be restored after he/she successfully completes the semester.
- The fees is payable in one lumpsum at the time of admission.


9. Duration of the Collaboration

This understanding with GoC (Maharashtra, Gujarat and Goa) shall be initially for a period of five years from the academic year 2021-22, extendable by mutual consent and subject to review of the academic performance of the admitted students. It can however be terminated by the GoC "At Will" so however that a student once admitted will not be withdrawn till the end of the academic year.

During the year, the Society committed in principle to support Army Goodwill Schools and those run by the Indian Army for its forces for upgradation of their infrastructure. The Schools covered are:

1. Army Goodwill School, Karu, Leh District

Karu is 30 km from Leh City Centre. It is



gateway to Panyong Lake via Chong La pass. The school is an integral and important part of community outreach at the remote and desolute LOC of Karu and provides quality education to the children of local populace. BEACON – SIES GRADUATE SCHOOL OF TECHNOLOGY

he SIES Graduate School of Technology as part of its ISR has set up project BEACON which provides vocational training to the under privileged sections of the society. The target groups are orphans, street children, school dropouts, housewives from poor families in the age group of 14-30 years. It is a skill enhancement programme covering several trades viz. plumbing, metal turning and welding, computer operating, electrician, tailoring and mobile & laptop repairs. The students are admitted free of cost

The course duration is six months which includes a foundation course for all, followed by trade specific training. All the students are given a basic tool kit pertaining to the trade, shoes and an apron. The course focuses more on practical hands on training. Each student is exposed to basics of grooming, banking, computer skills, spoken English and Mathematics as part of the Foundation Course. At the end of the training, the students are placed in industries for internship. After the internship, they would be facilitated to take certification / licensing examination from Government certifying agencies and supported to find suitable placements.

The outbreak of Corona virus resulted in the closure of the activities of Beacon except the Sewing and tailoring division where the trainees were brought in to stitch masks under the Million Masks Project.




The NSS team undertook several initiatives to positively impact the lives of students and society.

Major Projects Undertaken During 2021-22

- Under the project entitled, 'Climate Change Adaptation of Onion Crop' sponsored by Department of Science and Technology, Gol during 2021- 2022, field trails were conducted in the farms of 12 farmers in sinner and Niphad taluka of Nashik (M. S.) in kharif season. The trials were conducted on three varieties of onion with technologies of biofertilizer in the project. An online farmer's training programme was also conducted on 4th August 2021. In October 2021, the Annual report was submitted to the funding agency and in March 2022 Rs. 11,39,920/- was received from DST as the third installment of project.
- The institute completed Biomonitoring and Indexing of 56 rivers of Maharashtra at 156 National Water Quality Monitoring Programme stations for premonsoon season for Maharashtra Pollution Control Board (MPCB) in 2021. The draft report was submitted to MPCB for their evaluation. The first installment of Rs. 35,58,420/- was received during the year.

Industrial Consultancy Project

 The institute received its second bid project from Bharat Petroleum Corporation Ltd. on 'Propagation of seed balls in Maharashtra for developing green cover'. Total 4,88,050 seed balls of native tree species were propagated at 15 different sites located near 8 BPCL stations in Maharashtra. The plantation of native ornamental shrubs was conducted along railway tracks and other sites of Konkan and Central Railway in Raigad (M. S.). Different NGOs were involved in the project for making seed balls, propagation, and monitoring. In the first year Rs. 12,22,314/- was received as project grant.

Online Training Programme on the theme, 'Maintenance of Kharif Onion Crop in Variable Climatic Conditions' under the project 'Climate Change Adaptation of Onion Crop' on 4th August 2021

It was conducted to sensitize farmers on maintenance of onion crop during kharif season. Total 15 farmers participated in the training programme. The resource persons were from National Horticultural Research and Development Foundation (NHRDF), Nashik and SIES IIEM. The farmers cleared their doubts on methods of crop transplantation during heavy rainfall, disease and pest resistance techniques etc.

Training Programmes on Seed Ball Propagation Technology under BPCL Project

It was conducted on seed ball preparation, propagation and monitoring technologies for different stakeholders from BPCL, NGOs, Konkan Railways and Central Railways. The schedules of training programmes were as below:

Launch of Mission 6 R for Plastic Waste Management on 14th January, 2022

SIES Indian Institute of Environment Management (SIES IIEM) under SIES ISR has supported Bharat Petroleum Corporation Ltd. in the propagation of around five lakh seed balls near BPCL station sites in Maharashtra by involving different NGOs. At Konkan Railways site in Kolad, Raigad (M. S.) and Central Railways sites in Matheran, Raigad (M. S.), the ornamental plants have been propagated. The plantation of tree species requires site specific quality seeds or saplings. A seed ball (or seed bomb) is a seed that has been wrapped in soil materials, usually a mixture of clay and compost, and then dried. Essentially, the seed is 'pre-planted' and can be sown by depositing the seed ball anywhere suitable for the species, keeping the seed safely until the proper germination window arises. Seed balls are an easy and sustainable way to cultivate plants in a way that provides a larger window of time when the sowing can occur. The details of plant species propagated as seed ball and ornamental plants is given below:

The standard seeds were procured from certified vendors in Amravati (M. S.) and seed balls were prepared by involving an NGO M/s Happy Nature, Amravati (M. S.). More than 4500 seeds of mango, jamun, sitaphal etc. were collected by the staff and students of different SIES institutions that were converted into seed balls. The standard procedure for making seed balls was derived by SIES IIEM and NGO was trained on seed ball preparation. The substrate for making seed balls consisted of black clay, Jivamrut (organic fertilizer) and neem leaf powder. For the preparation of seed balls local youth and unemployed women through self help groups were involved after imparting proper training. The balls were dried at room temperature and packed as per the tree species in plastic gunny bags for dispatch.





his library for the visually impaired was started with a generous donation from Shri. Shashikant Vora, a past student of the college. Shri. C. Subramanian, Hon'ble Governor of Maharashtra inaugurated it on 12.4.1990. Standard text books in the subjects of Arts, Commerce and partly Science were converted into braille. Student volunteers were provided to each blind student to help them read in braille language. Audio cassettes of the standard lessons were recorded by normal students with clear voice and at a slow pace to make listening both educative and pleasure. No fees is recovered from the blind students. They are also provided free lunch under the 'Mid-day meal scheme'. Lotus Foundation supported our initial efforts. The late Shri. Nani Palkhivala blessed our initiative and encouraged us to expand so as to reach out to as many blind students as possible. Sun Pharmaceuticals, Barclays Bank, Ausenco Foundation and Sion Seniors Citizens Association have also contributed to creating the required infrastructure. Eventhough the centre started for visually impaired students, over the years, it has extended its activities to Learning Disabilities - Dyslexia, Dysgraphia, Discalculia, students with maladjustment problems / emotional crisis.



THE SIES SENIORS HOME (Care of the Elderly)



he foundation stone for the home was laid on 13th October 2000. The Home was inaugurated on 27th December 2002. Unlike the conventional home for the elderly, this is a unique social initiative mainly for the teachers of yester years who survive on a meagre pay and the terminal benefits received on superannuation were too little to lend dignity to their residual life.

The collapse of the joint family system accentuated by a severe shortage of the housing stock has struck a deadly emotional blow on the elders in the sunset of their life. Geriatry has its attendant difficulties. Loneliness and helplessness of the old has cast a stigma on the society itself. With several pay commissions being implemented, today a teacher earns a pay which is not less than what other professions offer but in the yesteryears in the name of nobility of the profession the material needs of the teaching community was never addressed. This has affected these teachers who are now in the last phase of their life. It is the need to provide them dignity in the residual years before they merge into the dust is what prompted the Society to create a Seniors Home which would have preference for Senior Teachers from any part of the city.

The Home provides free Boarding and lodging for teachers who cannot afford any contribution, limited to Boarding charges for teachers who receive nominal pension / interest on their savings and in respect of teachers with spouses whose income levels

are substantial, they would share a part of the capital cost and pay in full all the monthly charges. Very few rooms are reserved for the Administrators and affordable non-teachers. The Home has 18 accommodations and housed 18 teacher inmates as on 31.3.2022. It has a spacious community hall, a large dining area and a library. The Home is designed for disabled friendly and all the fittings in the apartments address the needs of the elderly. SIES Seniors Home was constructed at a cost of about Rs. 5.0 crores in 2002. The inmates teach the Veda Vidyarthis various subjects in their school curriculum.

The present Seniors Home is being relocated to a new building 'Kamakshi Nilayam' near the Bhakta Aanjaneya Temple. The new facility is being constructed at a cost of Rs. 11.82 crores. It is expected to be completed by March 2023.

MY RETIRED LIFE FOUNDATION (MRLF)



RLF activities for the year 2021-22 progressed on an extremely systematic and organized manner. Since physical meetings were not possible because of pandemic, all activities were organized on virtual mode (zoom platform). Since MRLF has a paid version of Zoom, there was no restriction of time though majority of the programs were of around 1.15 hours to 1.30 hours considering the interest span of members.

In addition to running a Seniors Home which forged a therapeutic union with the young Vidyarthis of Sri. Chandrasekarendra Saraswathi Veda Vidya Pitha, the Society uses its campuses during non-academic hours to further the cause of the elderly.

The SIES College of Arts, Science & Commerce, Sion (W), the SIES High School and the SIES (Nerul) College of Arts, Science & Commerce have partnered 'Aadhata', an NGO for care of the elderly. During the year, SIES (Dr. APJ Abdul Kalam) Memorial High School opened its gates during non-academic hours for the senior citizens. The campus of the institutions are thrown open for the elders of the locality for various activities of interest viz. indoor games lectures on healthcare, philosophy, training in traditional dances, singing etc. The two hour session every evening brings a sense of wellbeing, promotes comaradie and has helped create a self-help group that addresses all geriatric issues of its members. World Elders Day is celebrated on or around 1st October each year with a mega cultural event that brings out the youthful energy and talent in the elders. Shri. Arun K. Nanda, Chairman, Mahindra & Mahindra Holidays and Mahindra Realty is the moving force behind this activity.

The activities of each centre are structured to infuse enthusiasm and life into the elders and give moments of relief from the pains of the ageing body. Day wise activities are:

DAY	ACTIVITY

As part of these activities, the centres conduct various activities :

- 1. To facilitate basic Physical health awareness through Chair Yoga, physiotherapy, Aerobics, Zumba, Meditation.
- 2. For Mental health we engage them in indoor games, Sudoku, Card games, Memory test games, chess, and scrambles, debates, group Discussion.
- 3. We teach them E-learning to help those who wish to be tech-savvy.
- 4. To keep their Motor Skills active, we engage them into Art Base Therapy sessions like:
 - Painting/Drawings (Mandala, Vegetable/leaves painting)
 - Music Therapy
 - Paper craft (Tissue paper balls, tissue flowers, Greeting card /montage)
 - · Best out of waste
 - Friendship bands/Rakhi
 - Kandil/lantern, etc

Indoor games are also organised at regular intervals. The Seniors assemble each day between 4.00-6.00 p.m. The three centres have about 150 regulars who come to the institutions everyday. The activities were greatly curtailed during the last two years due to the corona pandemic.

SIES SRI. CHANDRASEKARENDRA SARASWATI VEDA VIDYA PITHA



he SIES Sri. Chandrasekarendra Saraswati Veda Vidya Pitha embraces the traditional Gurukula system of learning with modern education. It combines vedic learning with mainstream education. The Veda Vidyarthis enrolled in the Vidya Pitha study at the State Bank of India Officers Association School for regular 10+2 education. Vedic studies are imparted in a traditional environment. The inmates of the home double up as Hon. Teachers for these students teaching them English, Mathematics, Sciences etc. that form part of School education. A therapeutic union that provides the company of the elders for students moved out of their homes for learning and yearning for parents and the elderly who long for children, either having moved away from them or childless. This bond has emerged as a potent social initiative.

The present education system has been inadequate for the task of turning out sufficient young leaders who can lift the country out of the polluted waters of our public life and the slime and sledge of a corrupted economy. The aim of character based higher education must be to leave a residuum called culture which would teach a meaningful philosophy of life and enriched character. The traditional Gurukula system has several inherent advantages and promotes a Guru Shisya relationship that transcends all material barriers. In living with our times of integration of old values with modern day means to forge healthy and durable teaching methods that would ultimately lead to good citizens, SIES Sri. Chandrasekarendra Saraswati Veda Vidya Pitha was inaugurated. In this unique education model, children have the best of both the systems of education. The entire cost of boarding, lodging, education, healthcare and other needs of the Veda Vidyarthis is borne by the Society and no contribution is received from the students.

The system has already seen the emergence of Doctors, post graduates, Graduates who are conversant with Indian culture, tradition and art. The track record of the students who have passed out of the system bares ample testimony to the success of the dual education

PROF. PURUSHOTTAM KHANNA MEMORIAL LECTURE



Prof. Purushottam Khanna (14 July 1942 – 14 August 2004) was founder Director of SIES IIEM. He was also Director of National Environmental Engineering Research Institute (NEERI), Nagpur from January 1987 to January 1999 and served at CESE, IIT Bombay and IIT Roorkee. Dr. Khanna contributed immensely to diverse areas of environment management and extensively supported UNICEF, UNEP, WHO, ESCAP, FES and was a leader of

the Indian delegation to Earth Summit at Rio De Janeiro in June 1992. In 2007 he received Nobel Peace Prize Citation endorsed for his contribution in the areas of climate change. To recognize the contribution of Prof. Khanna in Sustainable Environment Management and to increase societal awareness to eco issues, SIES IIEM started the Annual Prof. Purushottam Khanna Memorial Lecture in 2017 – 2018.


SIES SOP STAR AWARDS 2022

Ltd., Mumbai came up with idea to launch product in India for the coming season envisaged to hand over product sample with attractive packaging considering brand image with additional features like: foldable pack with magnet concept; side clip for spoon holding; brand color combination; ribbon to tied up gift pack. The next two awards were for sustainability & innovation going to UFlex Ltd., Noida for Kraftika - a paper tube made with

FSC certified kraft paper having moisture resistance & high burst strength; and delivery containers made by Yash Pakka Ltd., Uttar Pradesh from agri-bio residue bagasse (compostable in the backyard facilities, add nutrition to the soil), for the delivery of food that helps to replace the use of single use plastics containers and providing safe food to consumers without any addition of harmful chemicals to it. The main proprietary feature is that these moulded pulp containers contribute to carbon sequestration and humus build-up.

The awards are instituted to recognize the talent among the Packaging Sector for their efforts in Innovations/ Creativity/ New Concepts/ New Developments in the field of Packaging covering Primary Packaging, Ancillary Packaging, Product Packaging, Eco Friendly Packaging, Printing, Packaging Graphics & Aesthetics, Packaging Machinery and Equipments / Systems, Packaging for Non Packaging Applications, Skill Developments at Academic / Institutional Levels.
